Immigration Rules

In July 2012, the Supreme Court gave two judgments relating to the Immigration Rules. These have important implications for some migrants whose applications under the Rules have been refused for reasons now shown to be unlawful. The judgments have also led to a great many new changes to the Immigration Rules. Two "Immigration Rules" information sheets provide further information.

The "Discretionary Leave" information sheet is also relevant to some of the recent changes to the Immigration Rules – particularly those relating to family migration and Article 8 (the right to respect for private and family life).

London Metropolitan University

Nearly a year and a half after it had said it would deal with all the asylum legacy cases, the UK Border Agency still has not concluded many of these cases. In July 2012, the Court of Appeal gave judgment in the case of *KA* (*Afghanistan*). This judgment relates to the tracing of lost family, and has important implications for separated child asylumseekers. The "Family Tracing 2" information sheet provides further information.
