Applicants who are refused a family visit visa will no longer have the right of appeal against the refusal. This change is expected to be implemented on or after 25 June 2013, after which point an applicant's options on receiving a refusal of a family visit visa application will be limited and include making a fresh application or applying for an internal review.
